About the NHFD patient report

The NHFD patient report is intended to help your patients understand the care they are receiving. It includes national statistics from the NHFD annual report, but you may also find it useful to make available to them the same statistics from your hospital.

This is a guide on where to find those local figures.

The 2014 annual report covers patients admitted 1 January-31 December 2013.

1 What will be done to help relieve my pain?

The number of patient receiving nerve blocks is depicted in Chart 3 (page 30) of the annual report.

You can also find the proportion of patients receiving nerve block in the online hospital reports:

Reports tab> Select your SHA Area> Select your hospital.

Select the month you would like the report to end in the 'Report Month' box on the left (eg if you would like to see records for January-December 2013 select '2013-12').

Click 'Annual Report', then 'Type of Anaesthesia'.

2 What will be done to help me if I have memory problems or become confused?

Your rate of recording AMTS score can be found in the regional tables in the annual report (page 76 onwards), and in more up to date form in the BPT run chart on the NHFD website.

3 When will I meet a geriatrician to plan my care and rehabilitation?

Assessed by orthogeriatrician:

- > Chart 2 (page 28) in the annual report
- > Shown in the regional tables in the annual report (page 76 onwards)
- > Shown in the Bluebook Indicators section of the online hospital report
- > Depicted in the BPT run chart on the NHFD website

4 Will I have surgery on my first or second day in hospital?

- > Time to surgery (day of/day after admission) can be found in Chart 4 (page 32) of the annual report
- > Shown in the regional tables in the annual report (page 76 onwards)
- > The numbers of patients with time to theatre of 36 hours or less is shown on the Best Practice chart on the NHFD website, and average time to operation is shown on the Overall Performance chart
- > Your average time to theatre is also shown in the Bluebook Indicators section of the online hospital report

5 Will a senior surgeon and anaesthetist be in charge of my operation?

A question that is often raised by the patient at the time of being consented for theatre. This is perhaps a useful topic for local review as part of the Hip Fracture team's monthly clinical governance programme.

If you participated in the Anaesthesia Sprint Audit of Practice, this data can be found in the ASAP report, which is available on the NHFD website.

6 What will be done to help me if I have difficulty with eating or drinking?

Local procedures and initiatives apply.

This is perhaps a useful topic for local review as part of the Hip Fracture team's monthly clinical governance programme.

7 How soon after surgery will I get out of bed and start physiotherapy?

Pressure sores:

- > Shown in Chart 15 (page 56) in the annual report
- > Shown in the regional tables in the annual report (page 76 onwards)
- > Depicted in the Patient Safety chart on the NHFD website
- > Listed in the Bluebook Indicators section of the online hospital report

Mobilised on day of or day after surgery:

Refer to local protocols. You can also export your data and use the 'Mobilised on day of or day following surgery' field to calculate your local figure for this.

8 Will I be able to go home, and if so, how soon?

Home from home rate: Shown in the regional tables in the annual report (page 76 onwards)

Length of stay:

- > Chart 18 (page 62) in the annual report
- > Length of Stay chart on the NHFD website

- > Shown in the regional tables in the annual report (page 76 onwards)
- > Average Trust length of stay is available in the Bluebook Average Times section of the online hospital report

9 How will I be kept informed of my progress, so that my family and carers can make arrangements for when I leave hospital?

Patient information leaflets and ward information boards may provide advice on this point.

This is perhaps a useful topic for local review as part of the Hip Fracture team's monthly clinical governance programme.

10 What will be done to try and reduce my risk of falling in the future?

Falls risk assessment:

11 What will be done to see if I need bone strengthening treatment?

Bone health assessment:

12 Will you check-up on me after I leave hospital?

30 day follow-up
